#### THE HOBBY GARDENER

Pruning is not my favourite job in the garden, but November and December are good months to start. Roses and deciduous shrubs will have shed their leaves and you will be able to see the structure and any

thorns. Cut out any dead or diseased wood right back to healthy wood, and any stems that are crossing and rub together. Do not prune back too hard as you could get some die back if we have a harsh winter. Reduce the height of buddleias and lavateras by a third to reduce wind rock, then hard prune buddleias in the spring as they flower on new seasons growth.

Now all my tender plants are under cover for the winter I am going to plant some winter flowering pansies, violas and primulas in my tubs to brighten up the garden. I will underplant them with daffodils and tulips that will give plenty of colour until late spring. Variegated ivies and heathers are a nice blend with the flowers. Hellebores can be grown in tubs, but the oriental varieties will not flower until February, trim back the leaves so you can see the flowers better.

Keep an eye on the weather forecasts as you will need

to protect tender plants with garden fleece if sharp frosts are predicted. Do not forget to feed the birds, they are so good at keeping down insect pests, slugs and snails in the summer they deserve to be fed and I love to see them.



If the weather is mild you may need to give your lawn a final cut. Mine is now lovely and green following much needed rain but I think that is more to do with the clover in it. I will need to do something about it in the spring. Happy gardening!

#### How many times have you lost your balance, slipped or stumbled in your life?

Certainly, in childhood I remember falling off my bike, not watching where I was going, or finding myself distracted by too many exciting things happening at the same time.

# Interesting and Curious Facts of

### Yesteryear

#### Guy Fawkes started in Wisbech!

It might seem strange

Wisbech we might never ever have had Guy Fawkes night.

Over four hundred years ago some people were going to blow the houses of parliament up with everyone in it including the King.

A recent experiment has shown that had they been successful, with 36 barrels of explosive they would have done it. The building would have been reduced to rubble.

We would nowadays describe this as terrorist activity. A recent example of this was the Brighton bombing in 1984. The provisional IRA which originated with Irish Catholics attempted to kill the Prime minister, Margaret Thatcher, and her cabinet. They did succeed in killing five people but not the Prime minister.

But four hundred years ago, it was the Catholic minority against the Protestant Church of England majority, instead of the IRA against the English government. So what was the problem?

It was Henry VIII, who took this country away from Rome and set up a religious body whose head was the King and not the Pope. The problem was that the Pope would not annul or invalidate his marriage to Catherine of Aragon. She couldn't give him children that he wanted so he had to get rid of her and marry Anne Boleyn. He passed the Act of Succession and the Act of Supremacy which basically meant that he decided that he would be the supreme head of the church and not the Pope.

But after Henry VIII, Queen Mary came to the throne, she was a Roman Catholic and so the country went back to Roman Catholicism.

But then, when Queen Elizabeth 1 succeeded her in 1558 the Church of England came back again and has been with us ever since.

During her reign, Wisbech Castle was made into an important prison for Roman Catholic priests. After some time, it was used for leading influential Roman Catholic political prisoners as well, and so with the approach of danger with the Armada invasion from Spain (1588), Robert Catesby and Francis Tresham, plotter and co-plotter of the Gunpowder Plot, were put in the Wisbech Castle so they would be out of the way and not cause a bother.

Unfortunately, this was not a wise move. Catesby and Tresham were resentful that they had been locked away and their only crime was that they were Roman Catholics and not Church of England. The state and the government would pay for this. All the prisoners were Roman Catholics, so they would discuss how to get rid of the Protestants and return the country to Catholicism. So, whilst they were whiling away their time here in Wisbech with nothing to do there is every likelihood that they came up with the seeds of the idea of blowing up the Houses of Parliament. This would give them the power they wanted. They had plenty of time on their hands. A number of historians have suggested this.

When James I came to the throne in 1603 the persecution of Catholics became even worse. In the following year Catesby started recruiting fellow conspirators. And then, in 1605, they had a lease on an undercroft, or basement under the Houses of Parliament and filled it with gunpowder. On November 4 Guy Fawkes was waiting to light the fuses but the authorities had a tip off and the following day, arrested him before he could do anything and then cruelly tortured him.

The authorities found the rest of the gang at Holbeche house in Staffordshire. In the ensuing battle four were killed and seven were wounded and captured. Their fate was to be taken to the Tower of London and then to be hung, drawn and quartered.

A year later there was an Act of Parliament designating November 5 as a day of thanksgiving. Effigies of the Pope were burnt but over the 1800's they changed from the Pope to Guy Fawkes and then children, raising funds for bonfire night, would go round asking "Penny for the Guy, Mr."

It can't be proven that Gatsby and Tresham thought of the gun powder plot at Wisbech but it is very likely. By the way, here is some useless trivia, Guy Fawkes is not the name for men's cutlery!

#### Entries from John Peck's October1832 Diary

This edition of John's diary now has him in his mid-forties. PCH October 1. Harrowing the bean land across at Harrold; cross-ploughing the 5a. St. Edmund's, dry as dust. In the evening a meeting at the Swan Inn to pass the highway accounts; more than half the rate to be got in. October 2. Started for Peterborough Fair. Bought 65 Ib. cheese at 8d. There never was a duller concern; Dined with Mrs. Underwood; home at 8. A fine day. October 3. Began to take up potatoes in Parson Drove Fen 9a. at 3/6 per last. Rode to Wisbech and stated to the Magistrates the amount of highway arrears; had more time granted. Forced to give over ploughing 12a. October 5. A smart rain fell in the night, and showers

continued to fall until evening, when the wind and rain increased unto the gales common at this season of the year. Carted some manure in the day to the Hill. October 6. At Wisbech market a little stir in the wheat

Corober 6. At Wisbech market a little stir in the wheat trade but prices still ruinously low. Sold Mr. Pate 50c. Tydd Fen wheat at 42/- per qr. Bought a two-shear ram of Mr. Cross for £7; many sheep in, prices generally low. October 7. Heavy rain fell in the night; Went to church in the morning; tea with Mr. Ulyat. The rains that have fallen just suits the clay lands, which were so hard, ploughing at a stand. We ought to be more thankful to God: He knows our wants and thus relieves them.

October 8. More heavy rain and stormy. Sent wheat to Wisbech. Began to plough in Tydd Fen for wheat, and ploughing the Hill for tares. Went round the town in the evening to collect Highway Rate, and got - promises.\* Cold and stormy. (\* UNDERSCORED.)

October 9. (MARGIN NOTE; Sowed 3b. tares.) To Tydd Fen. Began to plough the clover ground there. At Wisbech attended a Committee Meeting of Captain Yorke's friends; afterwards dined and spent the day with Joseph Peck, viewing his new bull & ram.

October 10. In Tydd Fen carting manure on the Home ground before ploughing for wheat. Tilting the bean land P.D. Fen with higgling team at 5/- per acre. To the potato pickers. No swallows seen this day; many were about last evening. A mild and pleasant day.

October 11. 9 feeding beast to 12a. 3 there before. Finished carting 41 loads manure on part of Home ground Tydd Fen. A new Meeting House building at Parson Drove, directly against Mr. Ulyat's garden wall a great insult, the sect delight in these things. Fine.

October 12. A blustery day. Round P.D. Fen, harrowing 12a. bean land & taking up potatoes. The last job goes on slow, the best hands being taken up with the drain, and the remainder care little for work, the harvest money not yet all spent.

October 13. A fine and drying day. Put 40 shearlings & 20 ewes to sheep bought of Mr. Cross.

October 15. Put 60 ewes to ram bought of Mr. Porter. 2 teams to harrow 15a. St. Edmund's before drilling. Combing stubble off 11a. Harrold; 2 teams ploughing in Tydd Fen & harrowing there. A bright and fine day. All very busy, not a hand unemployed.

October 16. Began to drill wheat on the 15a. St. Edmund's with my new drill, (from Mssrs. Smyth's, Peasenhall, Suffolk, £27), which seemed to act very well. In Tydd Fen finished ploughing 18a. clover land; rool & harrowing same before the drilling.

October 17. Finished drilling 8c. wheat on 15a. St.

Edmund's; being fallowed land this small quantity of seed is guite sufficient. (Note, the 25-cog wheel sowed Attended a meeting of the North Level this.) Commissioners at Thorney, when it was ordered to borrow another £20,000 (£1,977,000.00) for the works. October 19. Waggoning potatoes; got up 10 last 6 sacks. Rode to Mr. Morton's to look at potato steamer on Improved Principle. Dined and started home; made a wrong turn on a strange road, and was some time before I came to the right road again. The night frosty. October 20. A sharp rime frost. This morning at the potatoes and got up 10 last 6sacks, making 30 last 18 sack in the potato house. At Wisbech markets at a stand. Many buyers of seed wheat; as yet little has been sown, the potatoes &c. take up so much time.

October 21. A morning like June. Went to church; heard a good sermon preached by Mr. Blundell. Dined at home, tea with Mr. Ulyat. This week has been fine indeed. Getting up potatoes in high season, the roads dry and clean as midsummer, with every appearance of fine weather. A blue crow made its appearance this day, a token that winter will soon be here.

October 22. Began to drill white chaff red wheat on Home ground Tydd Fen; land very dry and dusty. Weighed up the wool sold to Mssrs. Ward's, 93 tod at 28/-, 1 & 3qr. ditto at 14/- and 2 & 3qr. tod of locks at 15/-. Mssrs G.&H. Ward, Ulyat & Jealous dined here.

October 23. 2 carts graving potatoes in Parson's 9a., 9½ last. Drilling the last of Home ground Tydd Fen, 10c. on 15a. The day very dry; clay roads hard and bright as marble, and but little water in the dikes.

October 25. In Tydd Fen drilling as yesterday. Machining stack of wheat (Weight's 12a., 31c.2b.) for seed at home, own hands and horses, 6d. per coomb. October 27. Another fine day. Graving potatoes in Tydd Fen, and finished drilling 13c.2b.2p. of red wheat on 18½ a. Tydd Fen. At Wisbech the markets duller, and merchants slow in buying. Universal want of money brings more grain to market than the demands require. Something seems wrong, and how to make things go right again requires a wiser head than mine.

October 28. In the afternoon went to Jeremiah Ulyat's little daughter's christening, a fine babe I wish happy.

October 29. Teams began to plough the 11a. oat stubble Harrold, and carts to the potatoes in Tydd Fen; all put off by rain, which begun at 9 and continued all day. Very seasonable. The ram bought of Mr. Cross drowned, a serious loss past remedy.

October 30. A fine day after the rain. Ploughing up potatoes in Tydd Fen; injured by water just after setting makes the digging bad - plough, and women to pick, the cheapest. Dressing wheat at P.D.

October 31. Began to sow red wheat on 11a. Harrold. Rooling the drilled wheat in Tydd Fen. Ploughing potatoes and carting same. A fine and drying day. Saw by the papers in evening corn lower.

#### THE FENLAND FAMILY HISTORY SOCIETY

We offer support and help to those interested in family history no matter where the family originated INTERESTING FACTS.

I heard someone say 'she is a friend with benefits' thinking it was a new thing. But it has been going on generations. I have recently been researching for a family who told me their surname had been changed from WHITE to BLACK but not sure why or when.

I have called them BLACK & WHITE they are not their real names. As I worked back through the generations, I found a Mary BLACK who was housekeeper to a farmer named Robert WHITE. A closer look told me Robert WHITE was a married man and living apart from his wife, he had living with him an unmarried housekeeper named Mary BLACK. Also showing on the census were 6 children with the surname BLACK. So, Mary was his 'friend with benefits'! And it explained why the family said their name had been changed from WHITE. We have another famous example of Mr Joseph MEDWORTH 1752 - 1827 of Wisbech Castle. Joseph Medworth was a married man, but his wife Sarah nee FISHER preferred to live in London. Joseph Medworth had housekeepers with benefits.

When housekeeper Mary ROWELL became a mother he housed her and children in a house in The Crescent, and employed another housekeeper with benefits, Sarah GIBSON aka MILLER. there appears to be at least 7 children by this union with benefits. Joseph Medworth built the present villa known as The Castle in 1816 using material from the previous castle. He also redesigned much of Wisbech including The Crescent. I am sure it is a story you can follow up and learn the interesting story of the life of Mr Joseph Medworth.

### Top Internet Tricks and Tips! By Philip Brooks from Diamond Byte

Following on from last month, here's some more top tips on surfing the Internet Superhighway! http:// and www

When entering an internet address, you don't need to type http:// or even www in the URL bar.

#### Move between the fields of a web page

If you are filling out an online form or other text field, press the **Tab** key to move to the next field and **Shift** + **Tab** to move back a field. This also applies to buttons: Press the **Tab** key to highlight a button, then press the space bar or Enter to "push" the button. Know your Internet browser shortcuts (Internet Edge & Firefox)

There are dozens of shortcut keys that can be used with Internet browsers, such as:

Alt + D or Ctrl + L will move the cursor into the address bar.

Hold down the **Ctrl key and press the + or -** to increase or decrease the size of text. **Ctrl + 0** will reset the text.

Press the **backspace key** or press **Alt + left arrow** to go back a page.

Press **F5** to refresh or reload a web page.

Press **Ctrl + F** to open the find box to search for text within the web page you are reading.

#### Use Internet search engines to their full potential

If you can't find what you want, try putting the text in quotes. For example, searching for 'computer help' without quotes returns results with "computer" and "help" anywhere on the page. However, if you search for "computer help" with the quotes, it will only return pages with "computer" and "help" next to each other. **Try alternative browsers** 

Most computer users use the default browser that comes included with the computer. However, there are other alternative browsers that are free to download and use and may have features your current browser does not include. Our favourites are Microsoft Edge, Google Chrome and Mozilla Firefox. Make sure your browser is up-to-date

Keeping your Internet browser up-to-date is important for both security and ensuring that web pages load properly. Most providers should automatically download updates and prompt you when they are ready to install.
